Commander's Corner

This past weekend, my wife and I attended the 1st Central District 2 Convention and Submarine Birthday Dinner and Ball, held in Lebanon, Indiana. I had originally intended to give you a detailed overview of the weekend... but, being "reminded" how verbose I can be, I've chosen instead to give you a more general overview. I'll reserve most of the details for some other time... perhaps after I receive the minutes from the "all hands" meeting.

Let me start by saying that Bill Anderson (the OTHER Bill Anderson), Hoosier Base Commander Dan Barker, the Hoosier Base members, and CD2 Commander Tom Barnes, did a first rate job of planning, coordinating, and hosting the event. The hospitality room, the tolling ceremony, the all-hands meeting, the dinner, the dance... all went off like clockwork thanks to the attention to detail. And all went out of their way to ensure that all attendees were welcome and had everything they needed.

Bonnie and I arrived late Friday afternoon, and were promptly greeted by CD2 commander Tom Barnes. After checking in, we were invited to the hospitality area where the Hoosier Base had gone above and beyond to ensure that all attendees had their fill from a seemingly endless array of hot and cold snacks and beverages of choice. The hospitality area was set up by the indoor pool so there was plenty of room... and plenty of tables to sit and eat, get acquainted, tell sea stories, compare base activities, play cards, etc. I had the opportunity to meet many of our district shipmates whom I knew only by email... and also the opportunity to renew old acquaintances.

There was nothing formal planned for Saturday morning. There was a chocolate "factory" (Donaldson's, as I recall) across the street from the hotel, so many of the ladies (and no doubt some of the men) were off for a tour. The formal activities started Saturday afternoon.

At 1300, we all gathered for the Tolling of the Boats ceremony. Master of Ceremonies Barry Whetstine instructed "diving officer" Dan Barker to sound the dive alarm. Following 2 blasts from the klaxon, the lights were dimmed. Barry then read the preamble, followed by the "tribute to our missing shipmates". He then began to read the list of lost boats. As each boat name was called, the bell was tolled and a candle extinguished. After Barry read a number of names, he passed it on to another submarine veteran... then another... then another. In all, 5 or 6 veterans read names, including our Central Region Director Art Randall. Following the last name, a benediction was given. The diving officer was then instructed to surface the boat. Following 3 blasts from the klaxon, the lights were brought back up and the service was ended. It was a touching ceremony... as all tolling ceremonies are.

From 1400 to 1530 there was a district meeting for all hands. I won't go into any great detail because much of the proceedings will be provided in the minutes... to be published within the next few weeks. However, one item I will mention was the decision to hold a CD2 convention every 2 years... with the option to have it more frequently (in an off-year) if there was sufficient business to warrant doing so. It was also decided that the location would be rotated among the CD2 bases, and those bases having submarines would have preference for the first few years.

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1700 brought the beginning of the pre-dinner cocktail reception. The pretty much says it all. At 1740 or so, we were "piped" into the dining room, to the tune of "Anchor's Aweigh", by bagpiper Fred "Doc" Gardner from Escolar Base. Dinner was served at 1800. Not much more to be said about that either. After dinner, at around 1900, there were a few ceremonies and presentations. National Holland Commander Bill Britt inducted a number of our fellow submarine veterans into the Holland Club, followed by the distribution of Senior Submariner certificates to those in attendance who qualified December 1946 and before. Then came keynote speaker VADM Albert "Big Al" Konetzni. I wish I could remember every word of his speech, or even the "3 points" he made... but sadly, I can't. But I can tell you that he was enthusiastic, and "happy as hell to be with submariners". If you ever have the opportunity to hear him speak, TAKE IT! Following the Admiral's speech, and the bestowing of some gifts and certificates, dinner was ended. At 2000, the dancing started... to the music of the "Rush County Big Band". As the name indicates, they play primarily "big band" music from the '40s and '50s with some from later eras. We listened and danced until about 1030, then called it an evening... since they couldn't play any tango music!

Sunday morning 0800 was the Base Commander Breakfast with CD2 commander Tom Barnes. This was a chance to discuss district issues, to share information, to ask questions. I thought it was really worthwhile and hope I have a similar opportunity in the future.

All in all, it was a great weekend. There were attendees from every one of the 12 CD2 bases, and 10 of the 12 CD2 base commanders... including all 4 Ohio Base commanders. Besides me, Phil and Opal Philipps and Bill Anderson also represented Columbus Base. I'm already looking forward to the next CD2 convention.



So essential was this signaling device to the wellbeing of the ship, that it became a badge of office and honor in the British and American Navy of the sailing ships.

A regular meeting of the Columbus Base of USSVI was held May 6, 2006 at the American Legion, Don Gentile Post 532. Elected officers present; Vice Commander, Dave Creekmore, Treasurer, John Leers, and Secretary, Elizabeth Kenyon. Vice Commander Dave Creekmore called the meeting to order at 1315. Our Holland Club profile this month is Joe Murphy. He was inducted into the Holland Club in August 2005. He shared some of his experiences and thoughts with Marv Pastor, our Holland Club reporter.



Joe enlisted in the Navy on January 30th, 1946 in Manhattan, New York.

Joe's sub training was a little different though, he didn't go through sub school ,he learned through OJT, on the job training. All of Joe's training took place on the USS Bugara SS 331. He served two years aboard the Bugara and qualified in August 1947. The Bugara was the first and only boat Joe served on. He reached the rate of EM 3/C also while serving on the SS 331.

When I asked him why submarines, Joe said the opportunity for quick advancement was his motivation.

Joe was discharged in December, 1947 in San Francisco.

Joe Murphy and Mamie were married on September 13th, 1953 in Brooklyn, New York they had eight children, three girls and two boys. Two of them served in the military, both in the U.S. Army. Dennis served 18 years and attained the rank of Captain in the Green Beret. Their daughter Sheila served 2 ½ years and was in the Military Police. Currently they are both members of the Gahanna Police Dept. Dennis is Chief of Police.

One of Joe's story lines takes him from Pearl Harbor to Kodiak , Alaska where the Bugara became involved in the rescue of a large barge in severe weather.

They traversed the Aleutian Islands through the Bering Sea, Seattle, Washington, Astoria and Portland in Oregon and finally into San Francisco.

Another one of Joe's favorites takes us to fleet maneuvers while operating out of San Diego. The Bugara was making an approach on an Air Craft Carrier at the same time a DD was running cover for a CV. Joe was in the control room when the words "high speed screws approaching" were relayed to the captain, evidently too late. What came next was all the noise and the SS 331 was shipping water. The Bugara went from periscope depth to one hundred feet. A dye marker was sent up and maneuvers ceased. Joe said the shears were so distorted they looked like a wine bottle opener. A good size chunk of the screws from the DD were found on the cigarette deck. Crew members from the Bugara took a train ride from San Diego to Los Angeles to meet the crew from the DD.

I guess alls well that ends well and this ended well when crew members were able to take in a football game between the L A Rams and Chicago Bears. He never said who won.

Joe, thanks for all your time and service.



A TAPPING ON THE HULL

As the day turns to night And the ocean rolls gently Sailors heed the call to flight To sail beneath the sea.

They drilled a thousand times About things that could go awry Danger in back of their minds Making mothers cry.

And it happens in the blink of an eye A sound crashing through your skull Half the crew instantly dies Half left tapping on the hull.

All they know is how to fight From the floor beneath the waves Another day into another night To avoid a watery grave.

And because of foolish pride That sends the leaders into a lull Courageous men left trapped inside Just tapping on the hull.

Is it day or is it night? Beneath the sea you cannot tell Batteries fail on emergency light Your own private brand of Hell.

And as the icy waters flow Through the rip on the starboard side The cold and wet take its toll A few more sailors die.

And another dog-and-pony came and went Did they really try rescue at all? And as apathy makes the world silent So goes the tapping on the hull.

And in my mind, the drills I rehearse My prayer, my tribute....all so small To the Thresher, the Scorpion, and even the Kursk Some of us will always hear the tapping on the hull.

This poem was written by David after the sinking of the Kursk.

If any of you have ever been to a military funeral in which Taps were played; this brings out a new meaning of it.

We in the United States have all heard the haunting song, "Taps". It's the song that gives us that lump in our throats and usually tears in our eyes. But, do you know the story behind the song? If not, I think you will be interested to find out about its humble beginnings.

Reportedly, it all began in 1862 during the Civil War, when Union Army Captain Robert Ellicombe was with his men near Harrison's Landing in Virginia. The Confederate Army was on the other side of the narrow strip of land. During the night, Captain Ellicombe heard the moans of a soldier who lay severely wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a Union or Confederate soldier, the Captain decided to risk his life and bring the stricken man back for medical attention. Crawling on his stomach through the gunfire, the Captain reached the stricken soldier and began pulling him toward his encampment. When the Captain finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead. The Captain lit a lantern and suddenly caught his breath and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw the face of the soldier. It was his own son. The boy had been studying music in the South when the war broke out. Without telling his father, the boy enlisted in the Confederate Army.

The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial, despite his enemy status. His request was only partially granted. The Captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral. The request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate. But, out of respect for the father, they did say they could give musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. This wish was granted. The haunting melody, we now know as "Taps"...used at military funerals was born.

The words are:

Day is done Gone the sun From the lakes From the hills From the sky All is well

Safely rest God is nigh

Fading light Dims the sight And a star Gems the sky Gleaming bright From afar

Drawing nigh Falls the night

Thanks and praise For our days Neath the sun Neath the stars Neath the sky As we go This we know God is nigh

In **2004**, our Columbus Sub Vets Base, having been in existence less than 6 months held its first ceremony at the Battelle Darby Creek, a Franklin County Metro Park Facility.

Despite the cool damp weather we had an excellent turnout. The four officers who launched our Base are to be commended for giving birth to the start of what has rapidly become an outstanding event. They were, in the picture on the left: Treasurer Eric Dreiseidel, Commander William V. "Bill" Anderson, Secretary Russell H. "Russ" Moody and Vice Commander James H. "Jim" Morton.
